

## The African Network for Internationalization of Education: Profile and Accomplishments

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## **Constructing ANIE**

- Originated from project on *Higher education in Africa: The international dimension* 2006-2008
- Aim was to come up with a book on developments on internationalization in different African countries
- 15 African countries participated- represented by senior researchers and later younger ones
- Project meetings were held in Cairo, Kwa Zulu Natal, Port Elizabeth, Nairobi
- The first idea on establishing a network came up in the Cairo meeting and was followed up in successive meetings
- Project was completed and the book published- new knowledge & identification of gaps
- The Nairobi meeting held in April 2008 discussed the founding of the network
- Founding documents developed and structures discussed
- Moi University, Kenya asked to provide space for secretariat

### What is ANIE

ANIE is an independent, non-profit, non-governmental pan-African network and think tank committed to the advancement of high quality research, capacity building, information sharing and exchange, transnational networking and cooperation, and policy advocacy on the internationalization of higher education to enable African universities and development stakeholders take optimal advantage of the opportunities presented by internationalization and globalization. Established in 2008, ANIE has its Secretariat based at Moi University, Eldoret, Kenya. ANIE takes the pioneering mandate of enhancing the understanding and further development of the international dimension of higher education in Africa by expanding knowledge and strengthening and sustaining a cohort of highly competent professionals, scholars, and researchers in the field of international education and development. ## Why ANIE?- Activity Areas

Based on the outcomes of the project it was a priority that the network focuses on;

(i) Research on internationalization in Africa

(ii) Capacity building/professional development for internationalization in Africa

(iii) Advocacy and policy dialogues on internationalization in Africa

(iv) Develops a framework for information sharing/dissemination

(v) Organize Annual conferences on internationalization in Africa

(v) Develops and sustains a new generation group of scholars in internationalization

### Achievements- Research

- Identified as one of the main functions of the organization
- Research agenda developed in 2009
- Research group on internationalization established
- 1<sup>st</sup> research grant in 2010 worth 99,000 pounds for project on *Development of a Framework for sharing of R & D resources on Internationalization of HE in Africa –*MRCI project from AAU implemented in collaboration with IUCEA
- 2<sup>nd</sup> grant by ADEA in 2011
- Since then ANIE has engaged in research projects supported by EU Commission (2), OECD (2), SIDA (1), NRF-South Africa (1), Aga Khan Foundation (1), DFID (2), DAAD (2), CODESRIA (1), British Council (2)
- Financial & in kind support from several organizations especially in organizing activities
- ANIE is developing a strong research portfolio
- Several publications have come out- books, chapters, policy briefs
- Our niche is in multicounty studies
- The new generation group
- 6 research projects are currently underway
- 8 books published so far, 2 special journal issues, several commissioned researches, contributions in university world news
- A book series with Sense Publishers has been approved
- Strong networks with relevant research organizations in Africa e.g CODESRIA
- ANIE has been involved in establishment of Ali Mazrui Centre for HE studies and now working

### Achievements- Capacity building

Capacity (individual/institutional) to support internationalization in Africa was identified as weak.

- Developing capacity for research on internationalization in Africa (research group/ new generation group)
- Professionalization of international offices (SIG has been created)
- Internationalization at home
- Internationalization of the curriculum (SIG has been created)
- Internationalization Strategy development (ISAS in collaboration with IAU)
- Best practices in international collaborations
- ANIE organizes training workshops for capacity building workshops
- In 2018- 9 workshops were held- (*i*) Europe-Africa relations (*ii*) Trans-National Education in Africa (*iii*) Using blended learning to internationalize the classroom (*iv*) Open access and knowledge partnerships (*v*) Promoting values in international partnerships
- Need to develop handbook for managing international offices/institutionalization of internationalization on campus
- A network of international office practitioners being developed- training programs
- Trainings for Deans and other key players

# Achievements- Information sharing and dissemination

- Developed an information sharing strategy in 2010
- Developed website, newsletter- 3 issues annually, monthly bulletin, list serve (different stakeholders)
- Using our partners and their frameworks for dissemination-AAU, IUCEA, ASIE, University Worldnews, EAIE, universities etc.
- We participate in several events annually
- ANIE developed AFIRE as its information sharing platform
- Social media
- Several international organizations rely on us for dissemination
- This is a strategic area where we intend to do much more

## Advocacy/ Policy dialogues

Putting internationalization on the agenda

How do we influence policy & make policy makers aware of developments in internationalization and what we do?

- Agreements and relations with influential policy platforms in the continent e.g AU, AAU, IUCEA, SARUA, ACDE
- Participation in continental policy meetings e.g AAU General Assembly, COREVIP, ADEA Triennial,
- ANIE leadership has to be influential-Chair PAU council, Board of AAU, Chair of IUCEA, Chair of ACDE
- ANIE is represented in international boards- SIU, NORPART, APPEAR, ASIE, IDEA, IUCEA
- Organizing sessions in international conferences
- Policy dialogues with different stakeholders e.g vice chancellors, deans
- Policy briefs- comprehensive internationalization



#### Achievements- Annual conferences

- Main platform for sharing knowledge and experiences on internationalization in Africa
- 9 Annual conferences held so far since 2009
- Predictable (1<sup>st</sup> week of October each year)
- We try to improve on quality each year (follow a clear template)
